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
#### LIFE IN THE CAMPS

V nedeljo, 16. aprila 2023 je Slovensko kanadsko zgodovinsko društvo obeležilo 20. obletnico svojega obstoja v cerkveni dvorani na Browns Line v Torontu. Slavnostna akademija se je pričela s kosilom in zaključila s premiero dokumentarnega filma "Življenje v taboriščih po izgonu leta 1945" kot nadaljevanje predhodnega z naslovom "Slovenski exodus 1945". ## What should we do with all this stuff?

In the end, my beloved aunt's life fit into 5 or 6 bulky brown grocery cartons. We called her Tetateta because my children could not understand the relationship between them and a "great aunt". When I explained that "great aunt" was akin to being aunt twice over, my daughters coped with the information by deciding she was like a doubled aunt and so they began to call her Tetateta. The name stuck. And she liked it as well.

Tetateta moved into Dom Lipa in the spring of 1988, not all that elderly but clearly suffering from dementia and in need of assistance. The best years of her life were then spent in Dom Lipa, free from the worries and distress that had made all her previous years scarring, traumatic. She had no children of her own, had never married. Her possessions reflected her frugal nature. Dishes and kitchen utensils. Linens. Books. Clothes. Letters and pictures. Only the last two boxes came with her to Dom Lipa.

She died in the spring of 2001. After her passing, we packed up her photos and letters, now silenced memories, and wondered what to do with them. Her life, so vital to us, was not that of a famous person whose death would attract major national archives.

Her letters traced her years in Canada, from the aftermath of World War 2 until her forgetfulness became an impediment for her. They should have gone to an archive, but in 2001, in the absence of an appropriate place for them, many got scattered and lost.

Only two years later the idea of preserving the Canadian Slovenian experience came into existence through the CSHS.

You may have had similar experiences. A family member has gone to a nursing home or has passed away,

leaving behind photos, letters, cards, recipe books, tapes, movies, diaries. All of these are valuable documents because they tell several stories. First, they describe the life of that person. But secondly, they tell the story of the whole family, of how they came to Canada and how they made a life here, through thick and thin. There was no going back. And thirdly, these documents tell the story of an entire community, the Canadian Slovenians. They name the community, making it stand out from among all the other ethnic groups who have established themselves in Canada. Slovenians are a small group and quickly disappear in the Canadian ethnographic picture. Just how quickly can be seen in my recent discovery that the University of Toronto libraries have listed the journal *Ljubljanski* zvon as being written in Slovak. (I wrote to the librarian to have this changed and after many months, the correct information was added).

If you are wondering what to do with the letters and documents left after a relative has moved or has passed away, consider the Archives of the CSHS. We are here with the sole purpose of ensuring that Canadian Slovenians are remembered as a community of vital contributors to Canadian history and that their history is available togenealogists and ethnographic researchers of the future. We follow established archiving regulations and practices for Canada. We are rather proud of our achievements especially since other ethnic groups have come to us for advice as they begin similar work in documenting their own histories in Canada.



#### PROMINENT CANADIAN SLOVENIANS

Many of us were pleasantly surprised this past year when we read about a new play that was to be presented at the Stratford Festival and that the author has a Slovenian connection. The play was <u>Women of the Fur Trade</u> authored by Frances Koncan. The play is historical in nature occurring at the time of the Riel Rebellion. It involves, "three very different women with a preference for 21<sup>st</sup> century slang sharing their views on life, love, and the hot nerd Louis Riel." It is written with much

wit, irony and humour and casts a satirical view of this period in Canadian history.





Frances has won several awards including REVEAL, Indigenous Arts Award, the Winnipeg Arts Council 2017 RBC On the Rise Award and was shortlisted for the Tarragon Emerging Playwrights Award.

The play Women of the fur Trade was well received and well attended at the Stratford Festival. We hope to have more detailed information about Frances Koncan in the future.

Bled Slovenian Cultural Club is part of the Slovenian Coordination Committee of Niagara (SCCN, Slovenski koordineiski odbor, Niagara). This year it was their turn to host Slovenski dan on Saturday June 24. The masters of ceremony were Ivan Kusic and Silvia Stankovic with welcoming remarks made by Bled president Frank Sampl and Mary Anne Demsar. Greetings were expressed by Slovenia's Ambassador to Canada Andrej Rode, Slovenian Representative for Canada of the Government of the Republic of Slovenia, Marjan Kolaric, and Honorary Consul General, John Doma.
